Health and Safety

N ow that Summer has arrived with a vengeance, remember that heat stroke is a very real danger to your pet. Dogs don't sweat, but must rely upon panting to control their body temperatures. Even a few moments in a closed vehicle can be fatal or cause brain damage. If you crate your dog or cat while traveling, use a wire cage even though the vehicle is air conditioned. Better yet, leave your pet at home or in a reliable boarding kennel.

If your pet spends much time outdoors, make sure that there is plenty of shade and fresh cool water available. Walk your dog in the morning or evening, not in the heat of midday. Avoid strenuous exercise or games during the heat of the day.

Symptoms of heat stroke begin with rapid, frantic, noisy breathing. The tongue and mucous membranes are bright red, vomiting may occur, and rectal temperature is high. Call your veterinarian immediately.

Another hazard was reported to us by Christe Creedon. A friend of hers recently lost her Lab when his head became stuck in a chip bag and he suffocated. A freak accident? Maybe not. We all know how dogs love to raid the waste basket when we are not around. A few crumbs of chips in the bottom of a bag can be in irresistible temptation. Why not make it a habit to cut the bags before disposing of them? While you're at it, look around your home for other tempting hazards. We've heard about child-proofing the house. We should do the same for our mischievous pets.

In the Summer, 1998 issue of the newsletter I wrote an article about my big boy Thor getting his paw caught in the fence. If I had not been at home when this happened, I might have lost him. I am repeating *(continued on page 2, column 2)*

All are spayed or neutered, heartworm tested, on heartworm preventative, have received all shots, have received medical treatment as needed, and have been temperament tested. A fenced yard is required to adopt a dog. Invisible fences or electric fences are not acceptable.
