A few of us were abandoned when we got old and gray, some were dumped last year to make room for a new cute and cuddly Christmas puppy, and of course some of us were booted out just after the New Year because no one wanted to take the time and effort to house train us and teach us proper manners. Let's not forget the owners who got us because their children begged for a puppy and promised to take care of it. You got it! It took about four months for the kids to lose interest, but instead of teaching their children proper responsibility they got rid of the dog.

We loved our owners and gave them everything they asked for. Was it our fault that they didn't teach us not to jump on people, or snatch stuff off the counters? We thought when they played tug-of-war with us, it was OK to grab the towels and rip them up. How can we tell right from wrong if nobody teaches us the difference?

This holiday season and throughout the year do all of the dogs in rescue around the world a favor and learn by our owners' mistakes. Here is a list of suggestions:

- 1 Do not get a pet (dog, cat, bird, hamster, etc.) for a child unless you, as the adult, plan to take proper care of it.
- 2 Take the dog to obedience class. Seldom does a dog that has had obedience training end up in a rescue.
- 3 Do not teach your puppy cute tricks unless you think they will still be cute tricks when he is all grown up.
- 4 Do your research before you get your new dog. Learn about the breed and what to expect. A lot of us were dumped because we got too big.
- 5 Buy a crate for the puppy so that he is safe and doesn't get into things when you are not there to supervise. Crates are not bad or cruel. Many of us like our crates as a place of our own.
- 6 Know how much it will cost to take proper care of a pet, and if you can't afford it, DON'T get one.
- 7 Last, but not least, remember the homeless dogs and puppies in shelters and rescues. ADOPT, don't buy from breeders.



Now it's holiday time, and this year we have been joined by more homeless dogs from the Hurricane Katrina disaster. It will be impossible for all of us to get adopted before the New Year. We would really like to have a Happy Holiday too. We all sent our wish lists to Santa and told him how good we have been. We even had Grandma tell him that we are really good kids. After all, it's not our fault we are homeless.

Could you be our Santa and make sure that we have a Happy Holiday?

Reminders for the Holidays and Winter Season

At this time of the year everyone is busy with shopping, decorating, cooking and baking, and a multitude of other things to be done. Amidst all the preparations don't forget to make sure that your home is safe for your dog. Here is a list of some things to keep in mind to make sure that everyone enjoys the holidays.

√ As the stress builds in your life, your dog can pick up on it. Take the time to reassure him that he is still important to you. $\sqrt{}$ Be careful with the goodies. A few extra treats are OK, but too much turkey, gravy and sweets can upset a dog's digestion. You don't want to have to deal with diarrhea, do you? √ Chocolate toxicity to dogs depends on a number of factors such as type of chocolate and weight of the dog. Don't take chances—no chocolate for your dogs.

√ Keep your dog away from house plants. Not all are poisonous, but unless you are an botanical expert, don't take chances.

√ Holiday decorations present hazards of their own. Glass ornaments, extension cords., tinsel and ribbons are tempting targets for a dog's curiosity. Be especially careful with candles. √ Antifreeze (ethylene glycol) is extremely toxic to dogs and humans. Its sweet taste makes it attractive, so thoroughly clean up any spills or drips in your garage or on your driveway.
