**ABOUT THE RESCUE**

HHGDR has operated as a Rescue since 1992. It became a registered 501(c)3 nonprofit in 1998, and to date has placed 1,427 dogs in carefully screened "forever" homes. HHGDR serves Ohio, extreme northern Kentucky, and eastern Indiana. Currently 26 dogs are available for adoption. In addition, the Rescue houses Sanctuary Dogs living out their lives in the safe environment of the Rescue (the latter unadoptable for health, age, or other condi-

tions). In 2010 HHGDR spent nearly \$20,000 on vet bills alone. Contributions are always welcome and are tax-deductible.

Unlike some large nonprofits, HHGDR has no paid employees. Not one person receives financial compensation for the work done for the Rescue—the only pay is the gratification of helping the homeless dogs, as well as dog kisses and hugs!

## HARD DECISIONS By Betty Smith

Our 12-year-old Great Dane Katie wouldn't respond to us. She just stood with her head down and her sides heaving. We managed to get her into the car and take her to MedVet (the emergency veterinary service in Columbus). When we finally arrived, they had to bring out a gurney to get her as she was unable to walk. They took her straight back and told us it would just be a few minutes until the vet could check her out. After x-rays, urine samples, and an ultrasound, she was diagnosed with polycystic disease. Cysts develop inside the kidneys and cause massive infection. The disease, while not fatal, is extremely painful and must be treated with antibiotics and pain medication. After a month on antibiotics, Katie was back to her usual self.

Unfortunately, the x-rays and ultrasound showed a tumor between her heart and lung. The vet said this tumor could have been there for years; with no prior x-rays for comparison, they couldn't judge if it was growing. We were told to wait 60 days; the follow-up x-ray revealed the tumor was growing. Treatment was surgery to remove the tumor and lung, then chemo.

Katie was my first Dane and my baby, but she was 12, and there was a very real possibility that the anesthetic would kill her. The surgery itself requires the ribs to be broken and pushed aside so the lung can be removed which would make recovery very painful. Once she had recovered, the chemo would make her very sick and weak. None of the vets who saw her could give me the least assurance that the cancer hadn't already spread, that she would survive the surgery and the chemotherapy, or how much time it would give her.

This is an emotional pit. You don't want to lose them but you don't want them to suffer. For those of you who have never been faced with a decision like this, it looks easy—the dog is elderly and not in the greatest of health due to the polycystic disease so you think there is no decision. But without the cancer, Katie might well live to be 14 as she was small even for a female. After much soul-searching, I made the decision. There would be no surgery. She

would live whatever time she had left in peace. I became educated on the signs to watch for that would indicate she was in trouble. And, if possible, I spoiled her even more than before.

Five months later, Katie ate her dinner as usual, went outside for a while, came back in and stretched out on the couch. Later, she asked to be let out and, after doing her business, started throwing up. When she came back in, her abdomen was very swollen and she was gagging. We managed to get her into the car and make it to MedVet. We had to wait for a while but in what seemed like a very few minutes, we had the news. The cancer had spread to her spleen and pancreas—one had ruptured and filled her belly with so much fluid they couldn't tell which. The only treatment was surgery to repair the damage. Thanks to pain medication and draining some of the fluid from her abdomen, Katie was not suffering.

We held her as the vet eased her passage from this life.

Ultimately, all any of us can do is make decisions with the welfare of our beloved friends foremost in our heart and mind. Sometimes, the decisions are easy and there are no gray areas. Other times, the decisions must be made based on our experiences and beliefs, but an element of doubt that we are doing the right thing generally creeps in. Did I make the right decision two months earlier? I would like to believe it wouldn't have made any difference if she had had the surgery and chemo but I don't know that for certain. I do know it would have made her life miserable for many weeks or months and I don't believe she would have wanted that any more than I would have wanted to see her have to go through it.

## THE CHRISTMAS PUP by Nancy Marconett

**W**hen I was about 8 weeks old a lady picked me to be a Christmas present for her grandson. She tied a big, red ribbon around my neck, put me in a wicker basket and took me to my new home. The little boy was delighted to find me under the Christmas tree. He squealed with delight, grabbed me and held me tightly. A little too tightly, but I'm not one to complain about getting attention. We had a wonderful time playing with the toys that grandma had brought with me.

The boy's mother told him that he would have to take care of me, because she sure wasn't going to do it. The boy promised that he would feed me, walk me and clean up after me.

For the first month or so the boy kept his promise and we had good times playing together in spite of the fact that I had to sleep in the garage. After a while, though, he found other things to do and spent less time with me. His mother had to remind him to feed me and take me outside for exercise and nature calls. By the time I was 6 months old I knew something was wrong. There were constant arguments between the boy and his mother. Sometimes the father would join the battle and send the boy to his room. Everyone was angry!

One day we all got into the car and drove a long way out into the country. When we stopped, we all got out. I thought we were going to play or at least take a walk. I heard the father say that I needed room to run, and someone would pick me up and give me a home. Then they all got back in the car and drove away. I tried to follow, but I couldn't run fast enough to catch up with them.

I was heartbroken and scared. I didn't know what I was going to do. I walked and walked until I was so tired that I had to lie down. I must have fallen asleep, because when I woke up it was getting dark. I was getting really hungry and scared. Then a

car turned into the lane and stopped. A man got out and came over to me. He looked me over and said "Either you're lost or someone dumped you. I already have five dogs so I can't take you with me, but I'll bring you food." A little while later he did bring me some food. There was a small creek across the road where I could get water to drink.

I stayed there and the man brought more food and petted me some, but he wouldn't take me with him. Late in the second day a woman drove up and stopped. The man was there as if he were expecting her. She got out and talked with the man for a while, then she opened the back door of her station wagon. She gave me some treats and put a collar and lead on me. At first I didn't want to get into the car because I remembered what happened the last time I got into a car. She talked to me in a kind voice and petted me. Finally I decided I could trust her so I went with her.

I don't know how long we drove because I fell asleep. It felt so good to be warm and comfortable again. I woke up when I heard a lot of dogs barking. We had stopped and the woman was getting out of the car. Another woman was coming toward us and I heard her say "He's just a baby! Let's get him inside." There were a lot of other dogs in the house and at first it was kind of scary. Then I realized that everyone was welcoming me and I felt much better. Now I am at the Great Dane Rescue, and I know that there are people who care about me. Grandma says she will make sure that I get a home with people who will love me and take care of me
